

6 in 10 Ohio adults believe addiction is a disease; varies by political party

The *Ohio Health Issues Poll* (OHIP) is conducted every year to learn more about the health opinions, behaviors and status of Ohio adults. In 2018, OHIP asked Ohio adults several questions about their opinions of addiction as a disease.

The study of the brain and addiction is a growing science. The National Institute on Drug Abuse describes addiction as a "chronic disease characterized by drug seeking and use, despite harmful consequences" that can be affected by an individual's genetics, their environment and individual characteristics.¹

WHAT DID OHIP FIND?

OHIP asked, "Do you believe addiction is or is not a disease?" Six in 10 Ohio adults believe addiction is a disease (62%) while 3 in 10 Ohio adults do not believe it is a disease (31%) and 7% were not sure.

Responses varied by political party identification. Half of Republicans (53%) and close to 6

in 10 Independents (57%) believe addiction is a disease. That compares with more than 7 in 10 Democrats (74%).

Responses also varied by the type of community in which adults live. About 7 in 10 Ohio adults living in an urban county (67%) believe addiction is a disease. That compares with 6 in 10 adults living in a rural or suburban community (58%).

OHIP then asked those adults who believe addiction is a disease, "Do you believe that addiction is a physical disease, a psychological disease, or both a physical and psychological disease?"

Among Ohio adults who believe addiction is a disease,

The 2018 Ohio Health Issues Poll (OHIP) is sponsored by Interact for Health. OHIP was conducted May 22-June 19, 2018, by the Institute for Policy Research at the University of Cincinnati. A random sample of 816 adults from throughout Ohio was interviewed by telephone. This included 363 landline telephone interviews and 452 cell phone interviews. In 95 out of 100 cases, statewide estimates will be accurate to ±3.4%. There are other sources of variation inherent in public opinion studies, such as non-response, question wording or context effects that can introduce error or bias. nearly 8 in 10 feel it is both a physical and psychological disease (76%). About 2 in 10 Ohio adults believe it is a psychological disease only (21%), and 3% believe it is a physical disease only.

WHY DO WE ASK THESE QUESTIONS?

The public's perception of substance abuse affects the availability of resources including access to treatment and other life-saving measures. As the state works to address addiction it is useful to understand where public opinion stands.
